Qing Shan Campus

Kang Chiao Bilingual School has upheld the vision of nurturing international leaders and the goal of a 15-year refined, coherent educational system from K to 12. The school opened with a kindergarten and an elementary school and has since expanded to include junior and senior high schools.

Students belong to different age groups and their learning needs are quite different. Individual needs require that the school not only teach students in accordance with their aptitude, but also provide them with the aids and facilities appropriate to their grades.

It became necessary to secure another location for a second campus to satisfy the developmental needs of children from different age groups. Planning for the creation of a second and different learning environment began two years after the completion of the Xiu Gang Campus.

Planning

The Qing Shan Campus covers an area of 2.27 hectares, and has an additional 1.2 hectares of green spaces and nature study areas. The total area is 3.5 hectares and will house the kindergarten and the elementary school. It is expected that construction will be completed in August 2011. There are three main parts to the construction: the kindergarten, the elementary school teaching and administration building and a multi-purpose activity center. Construction will proceed in two stages. The first stage consists of the construction of the kindergarten and the elementary school teaching and administration building. The second stage consists of the construction of the multi-purpose activity center which will include a gymnasium, a swimming pool and a concert hall.

Prospect

When Qing Shan Campus opens, the kindergarten and the elementary schools will move into the new buildings, leaving Xiu Gang Campus entirely to the junior and senior high schools. This arrangement represents the culmination of the goal Kang Chiao has always pursued.

• The Fulfillment of Adaptive Instruction

Based on the solid foundation that Kang Chiao has built, the teaching quality in both Xiu Gang and Qing Shan campuses will be enhanced through the reorganization and reallocation of the educational resources. The focus of the Qing Shan Campus is enlightened education for kindergarten and elementary school students. We aim to foster motivated students, with strong foundations in multi-intelligence, skill-based learning and hands on projects. The Xiu Gang Campus will continue to offer a learning environment conducive to the advancement of learning and learning skills for junior and senior high school students through a strong focus on individual research projects and cooperative learning. Secondary students will explore career options and build on their independent abilities and lifelong learners.

Rice Dumplings

Rice dumplings (also known as zong, or zongzi [粽,粽子]) are a traditional Chinese food, made of sticky rice stuffed with different fillings and wrapped in bamboo leaves. They are cooked by steaming or boiling.

Origins

Rice dumplings are traditionally eaten during the Dragon Boat Festival which falls on the fifth day of the fifth month of the Chinese lunar calendar (around earlyto mid-June), in memory of the death of Qu Yuan [屈 原], a famous Chinese poet from the kingdom of Chu [楚] who lived during the Warring States Period [戰國時 代] (also known as the Era of Warring States, covering the period from 475 BC to the unification of China under the Qin Dynasty [秦朝] in 221 BC). Known for his patriotism, Qu Yuan tried unsuccessfully to warn his king and countrymen against increasing the size and importance of their Qin neighbors. When the Qin Dynasty general Bai Qi [白起] took Yingdu [郢都], the Chu capital, in 278 BC, Qu Yuan's sadness was so deep that he drowned himself in the Miluo river (汨羅江) after writing the famous poem, The Lament for Ying [哀 郢]. According to legend, packets of rice were thrown into the river to prevent fish from eating the poet's body. Another version states that rice dumplings were given to calm a dragon that lived in the river.

Description

Wrapping a rice dumpling neatly is a skill which is passed down through families. Rice dumpling-making was traditionally a family event with everyone helping out, but that is less common now.

Traditional Chinese rice dumplings can be wrapped in many different kinds of leaves. Each kind of leaf gives its own unique smell and flavor to the sticky rice. Leaves from plants such as bamboo, lotus, maize, banana and shell ginger are frequently used. The fillings used for rice dumplings vary from region to region, but the rice used is always sticky rice (also called sweet or glutinous rice). Depending on the region, the rice may be lightly precooked by stir-frying or soaked before using. Fillings may be sweet, and include:

- Skinless green beans
- Red bean paste
- Jujubes

Or savory with fillings such as:

- Char siu (Chinese barbecue pork)
- Chinese sausage
- Chinese black mushrooms
- Salted duck eggs
- Chestnuts
- Cooked peanuts
- Dried shrimp
- Scallops
- Red-cooked pork
- Curry Chicken

Red bean paste rice dumplings take a particularly long time to prepare. The red beans used for the filling must be simmered until soft, drained, skinned, and mashed into a paste that is stir-fried with sugar.

Rice dumplings need to be steamed or boiled for several hours depending on how the rice is treated prior to filling. Once cooked, the rice dumplings can easily be frozen for later consumption. Frozen rice dumplings are available for sale in many Chinese markets.
