

What is the flu and Why Do I Need Hu Shot Every year?



The influenza, or flu, is a winter illness caused by an influenza virus that infects the entire respiratory tract. Your head, muscles, and throat hurt, and you may have a high fever. True influenza can be a serious illness, though people often use the term "the flu" to describe minor respiratory infections.

The influenza virus mutates and changes every year. So every winter, the virus that causes the flu is different from the virus of the previous year. Each year, a new flu

What's the Difference between Seasonal Flu, Pandemic Flu, and Avian (Bird) Flu?

Influenza, or flu, is a respiratory infection caused by several flu viruses. Flu viruses are classified as types A, B, and C; type A has a number of subtypes. The flu is not the same as the common cold, nor is it related to what is commonly called the "stomach flu."

Seasonal Flu

Seasonal flu is the term used to refer to the flu outbreaks that occur yearly, mainly in the late fall and winter. It is estimated that between 5 and 20 percent of Americans come down with the flu every flu season.

Pandemic Flu

Pandemic flu refers to particularly virulent strains of flu that spread rapidly from person to person to create a world-wide epidemic (pandemic).

Avian (Bird) Flu

In nature, the flu virus also occurs in wild aquatic birds such as ducks and shore birds. It does not normally spread from birds to humans. However, pigs can be infected by bird influenza (as well as by the form of influenza that affects humans) and can pass on the flu to humans. In 1997, it was discovered that virulent bird influenza had skipped the pig step and had infected humans directly, causing a number of deaths in Asia.

These instances of bird flu in humans have raised concerns that if this type of flu could at some point be transmitted between people, a new pandemic would occur. Thus, the term bird flu, or avian flu, is currently being used to refer to a possible pandemic flu. That is why you need a flu shot every year. OUCH!!

Transmission of the Flu

You can get the flu if someone around you who has the flu coughs or sneezes. You can get the flu simply by touching a surface like a telephone or door knob that has been polluted by someone who has the flu. The viruses can pass through the air and enter your body through your nose and your mouth. If you have touched a polluted surface, the viruses can pass from your hands to your nose or mouth. Infected people may be able to infect others before they realize that they are sick or after becoming sick for several days up to seven days which means that you may be able to pass the flu to someone else before you know you are sick or while you are sick.

You are at the greatest risk of getting infected in highly populated areas, such as in crowded schools.

Pork and other pig-derived products, like hams, sausages, etc., if properly handled and cooked, do not transmit the flu because the flu virus is killed by cooking temperature of 70°C.

Prevention of the Spread of the Flu

Some simple steps can help in preventing the spread of the flu:

- * Wash your hands often
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth because virus can spread this way
- * Use of face masks when you enter the crowded places in order to protect your nose and mouth from other's coughs and sneezes
- * If you get sick with the flu, stay home from work and school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them
- * Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze and throw the tissue in the trash can after you use it. Then clean your hands and do so every time you cough or sneeze
